Esq. be the Chairman of this Committee -

that this Committee remains in permanent  
session until the danger appears to have  
passed - Carried unanimously -

Moved by J. Hellens Esq. seconded by C. H. Dewhurst Esq.  
that Scouts be sent out in every direction to  
obtain information - Carried

Moved by Robt. Hill Esq. 2d by C. H. Dewhurst Esq.  
that Mr. Lidy & Mr. L. Garner be appointed Scouts  
in the direction of Ridgeway - Carried -

Lidy & Garner dispatched by short cut in the  
direction of Ridgeway - Done - 5 P.M.

Chief Constable Patterson called upon to set in  
his official capacity -

Dr. Schoolly was added to the Committee  
by unanimous agreement - In being present -  
Messrs. Bennett & Potter appointed Scouts  
to go in the direction of Thimensville by short cut  
route - & keep to the left as much as possible  
without going <sup>600 ft</sup> out of the way - Done

Constable Gilchrist directed to get two or  
men to act as patrols and report as soon  
as possible -

J. Linder reports - Females seen by Robt.  
Robt. this morning at Rens - Tandill saw  
them this side of Bucks Tavern - number  
not known - and further no doubt that  
Dr. Thompson is shot -

Dr. Diffee sent in direction of Shanks Crossing by  
short cut and soon <sup>if necessary</sup> - Done 6.30 PM

Mr. Cafferty reports that he is satisfied that the feeling of the American people at Buffalo is quite unanimously in favor of the French - and that he is satisfied that authorities there are favoring the French - he relates a conversation between the principal collector of customs there and his subordinates that confirms this opinion.

Patrol East - reported sound of artillery to the

Word also by telegraph that more soldiers are leaving  
St. Catharines for Port Colborne -

Patrol South reported all quiet - 3 relief out 2.45 -

Aqueduct guard came in and reported all quiet  
3.20 am - Daylight -

Patrol South reported all quiet - 4 relief out 3.20

Thos Whitwell & Jas. Chamberlin -

A train has just passed up with soldiers to  
Port Colborne from St. Catharines -

D. Rice & B. Hill sent as scouts in direction  
of Ridgeway to see after our scouts - we have  
heard nothing from any of them during the night -  
we left at 3.45 am.

Patrol East - reported all quiet - 4.20 -

Guard discharged with the thanks of the  
Committee - and they unanimously offered  
their services further when required by the  
Committee - 4.10 am - Daylight -

4.20 am - Didsy & Farmer - Scouts returned -  
We went down to Glens Falls & waited there  
for they were organizing a company to go  
out to reconnaitre - Six horsemen went out  
with us to the outskirts of Bucks Town -

There were no certain signs of French except  
a light in the bush and some noise - Bucks  
Town was deserted - We had communication  
with Ridgeway - The Volunteers were there -  
We also had communication with Chippewa  
- There were about 400 regulars there and six pieces  
of artillery - The Michigan was lying in the  
river but it was thought she did not  
go to prevent French from crossing - We  
had 3 of our person being hurt so far -  
the French had 20 killed when they got there -

We left Bemont & Pather going up to Ridgeway about 12 o'clock - midnight - We sent Rice & Hill - they went on - The people had concealed their stock - and seemed to be quiet -- heard nothing from Point Abino - The Fenians are now said to be in the ditches of Black Creek - Allan of Black Creek and some others were taken prisoners by the Fenians - They were out as scouts - and got surrounded - - It is said that the Fenians were collecting provision and were fortifying themselves at the old Fort at Fort Erie.

am. B. Diffee Scout to Point Abino returned - I was at Point Abino - The Fenians have all left Fort Erie - They are at the Newbigg farm 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  miles below Fort Erie - They ~~had~~ left the prisoners at home - I left at ten o'clock - I was within three of them - They took 40 or 50 head of horses - Hundreds of people in families with their stock were concealed in the swamps on Humberston Town Line -

10 am. Mr. Garret reported a Fenian in his neighborhood - Chief Constable Patterson sent for him at once - Scouts report an engagement going on at Fort Erie since sunrise - Cannon and small arms plainly heard distinctly at Daems Ridge - Telegraph arrived to say that the Volunteers had taken possession of Fort Erie -

Mr. Vanderburgh The Telegrapher agreed to keep  
his office open all night - -

In office with horses reported - ready for service 7.00 P.M.  
Dinner - do - do - do - do - 7.10

No & Courts returned yet - 7.30 P.M.

Mr. L. Hobson by Sheriff arrived - I stayed at  
Mr. Grahams last night - about 4 o'clock this  
morning Mr. H. awakened me with the report  
that the Fencibles had landed - The Report was  
brought up to him by Mr. Murray Officer of the  
Customs at Fort Erie - Two small boats came  
over towed by a tug - An immediate call off  
to inform Mr. Graham - and then returned. Mr.  
Moore then came & said that they had landed  
1000 strong when he came - and boats had gone  
back for more - Young Johnson then came  
& said they were 1000 strong and divided into squads  
- One squad taking the Lincoln or Anderson road  
and the other on the Ferry hill on the Gordon  
road - that they saw him & fired 16 or 17 shots  
but he escaped - I then came to Ridgeway and  
arrived there about 9 A.M. & heard that they  
had burned the Lowerwin bridge & saw the  
smoke - about 8 or 1/2 to Lowerwin bridge  
to burn it, got the breakfast at Lincroft  
- took some horses and then went back - I  
left about 1/2 past 9 - Elliott & Thompson  
on prisoners I was informed by Adam Graham  
he said he left the Ferry about 10 A.M. - and that  
they had possession of all buildings at Fort Erie  
and a guard over them - A majority were up at the  
old fort & the rest scattered along down the  
river as far as Millers about 4 miles - The  
U.S. gunboat in the river to prevent more  
crossing -

D. Rice with horses reported himself - He is at the  
City Hotel ready - -

News arrived that a vessel had been seized at  
Throold loaded with Fenian arms —

A suspicious circumstances reported - A man  
at Railway station or Doans - thought to be a  
Fenian - Constable Patterson sent to examine  
him - he returned and said the man acted

- 3d. James Roder <sup>+ 2 friends</sup> returned - we went to Bucks Stoen <sup>9.30</sup>  
and was told there that the Fenians were 2 miles  
from them at J. Graham's Caving - we went on  
to the side of Railway & halled - we were informed  
that they were watching - we halted this in the edge  
of the woods - a man came and inquired who  
we were - Roder went and met him - & he wanted  
Buckles saddle - after talking some time - he saw  
others of the Fenians in a corner of the field not  
far off. They were all armed - we thus fled -  
We saw a man by the name of Patrick Caving  
& he said that he came over with the Fenians  
last night and there were about 3000 - and  
now were coming tonight - Caving said that  
he had deserted from them - they had not  
much baggage - they had taken about 40  
horses - and were taking cattle - Dr. Thompson  
is not killed but is a prisoner - also Dr. Elliott  
and Mr. Gabble -
4. The Cofferty reported news conforming other  
info given for the Committee - he came from  
Buffalo.
